The NCA 105<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention is now accepting submissions via NCA Convention Central. Nearly 100 NCA interest groups, affiliate organizations, and special series have issued calls for submissions. To review the calls, click the "View Calls" tab on NCA Convention Central. Interest groups, affiliates, and special series are listed alphabetically. You do not need to have an NCA Convention Central account or be logged in to view the calls. You do need to have a Convention Central account to submit.

## Submit Your G.I.F.T.S Today

What types of knowledge, skills, and competencies comprise Communication for Survival? In what contexts might our students benefit from learning experiences that will help them better negotiate the diverse, fluid, and challenging contexts of communication?

Great Ideas for Teaching Students (G.I.F.T.S) offers sessions in which scholars and teachers from different types of institutions share concrete activities, assignments, and strategies that promote deep learning of communication concepts, skills, theories, etc. As <a href="Chickering and Gamson">Chickering and Gamson</a> put it: "Learning is not a spectator sport. Students do not learn much just by sitting in class listening to teachers, memorizing prepackaged assignments, and spitting out answers. They must talk about what they are learning, write about it, relate it to past experiences, apply it to their daily lives. They must make what they learn part of themselves."

We encourage submissions that integrate active learning approaches to instruction - approaches that actively engage students in deep learning of the course materials. Teaching and learning activities and approaches that draw from the scholarship on inquiry-based learning, problem-based learning, metacognition, reflective teaching and learning, and student-as-partner are particularly encouraged. Creative pedagogical ideas for traditional classroom settings, online/hybrid setting, outside of the communication classroom contexts (e.g., co-curricular activities, consulting venues, community engagement initiatives, and engaged scholarship projects), or any other non-traditional learning environments are welcomed.
