The NCA Opening Session, "Race Relations in Charm City: Communicating Social Justice," featured both NCA members and community members examining ways in which social justice work seeks to improve issues associated with race. The NCA Opening Session was sponsored by the Waterhouse Family Institute for the Study of Communication and Society.

The <u>Carroll C. Arnold Distinguished Lecture</u>, "Mobility, Containment, and the Racialized Spatio-Temporalities of Survival," was delivered by Lisa A. Flores, University of Colorado, Boulder. Flores explored what it means to think about survival through the intersecting prisms of mobility and containment. The Carroll C. Arnold Distinguished Lecture was sponsored by <u>Pearson</u>.

NCA President Star A. Muir delivered the <u>Presidential Address</u>, "The Coming Dark Age and the Future of Scholarly Associations."
