Great Ideas for Teaching Students Call for Submissions

"Crossroads" symbolize connection and convergence of scholarship, research, and teaching. This intersection is effectively demonstrated in the Great Ideas For Teaching Students (G.I.F.T.S) sessions offered at the NCA Annual Convention. These sessions represent the convergence of knowledge, teaching activities, and discussion in short presentations by NCA members representing K-12, community colleges, liberal arts colleges, and research universities. These successful classroom strategies can be used in a variety of courses as soon as the convention ends.

G.I.F.T.S offers sessions in which scholars and teachers share concrete activities, assignments, and strategies that promote practical learning and application of Communication concepts, theories, skills, etc. As Chickering and Gamson put it: "Learning is not a spectator sport. Students do not learn much just by sitting in class listening to teachers, memorizing prepackaged assignments, and spitting out answers. They must talk about what they are learning, write about it, relate it to past experiences, apply it to their daily lives. They must make what they learn part of themselves." G.I.F.T.S presents the tools to help teachers help students realize these truths.

We encourage submissions that integrate active learning approaches to instruction—approaches that actively engage students in deep learning of the course materials. Teaching and learning activities that draw from the scholarship on inquiry-based learning, problem-based learning, metacognition, reflectivity, and student-as-partner are particularly encouraged. Creative pedagogical ideas for traditional classroom settings, online/hybrid settings, and nontraditional settings (consulting venues, community engagement initiatives, etc.) are welcomed.
