Carroll C. Arnold Distinguished Lecture

The <u>Carroll C. Arnold Distinguished Lecture</u> features the most accomplished and highly regarded scholars in the discipline of Communication. I am proud to announce that Dr. Thomas K. Nakayama will deliver this year's lecture.

Dr. Nakayama is Professor of Communication Studies at Northeastern University. Their research interests lie at the intersection of rhetoric, intercultural communication, and critical theory. They are co-author of *Intercultural Communication in Contexts*, *Experiencing Intercultural Communication*, *Human Communication in Society*, and *Communication in Society* and co-editor of *Whiteness: The Communication of Social Identity* and *The Handbook of Critical Intercultural Communication*. Dr. Nakayama is a member of the NCA Publications Council, serves on a number of editorial boards, and is the founding Editor of the *Journal of International and Intercultural Communication* and the co-founding editor of *QED: A Journal in GLBTQ Worldmaking*. Dr. Nakayama is a former Fulbrighter at the Université de Mons-Hainaut in Belgium and has been named a Distinguished Scholar by the Western States Communication Association, a Distinguished Research Fellow by the Eastern Communication Association, and a Distinguished Scholar by the National Communication Association.

Dr. Nakayama's address is titled "<u>The Challenge of Global Whiteness</u>." Whiteness is not simply about racialization but about a much larger and entrenched system shaped by multiple forces. Looking to the past and the present, the global and the local, this presentation will use a dialectical approach to expose the ways that these tensions give rise to

whiteness. A greater understanding of whiteness will be developed, and its impact as a major force in all areas of Communication will be illustrated.

Please join us on Friday, November 20, at 5:00 p.m. Eastern Time for what promises to be an important and transformative presentation.
