National Communication Association Past President James W. Chesebro was dedicated to making the discipline of Communication more diverse and inclusive. # NCA Opening Session: Mental Health at the Crossroads: Intersections in Health and Society

The NCA Opening Session, sponsored by the Waterhouse Family Institute for the Study of Communication and Society, will highlight the factors that impact mental health and mental health treatment in Indianapolis and the nation. Specifically, panelists will examine ways in which mental health intersects with race, gender, sexual orientation, educational attainment, and income.

This interdisciplinary panel will include scholars and Indianapolis community leaders whose work is dedicated to greater understandings of mental health and social justice. ## Department Chairs and Doctoral Chairs/Graduate Directors Forums

Each year, NCA sponsors sessions for Department Chairs and Doctoral Chairs/Graduate Directors to discuss important topics and current issues that face college and university administrators.

The <u>Doctoral Chairs and Graduate Directors Forum: At the Crossroads of Doctoral Student Placement: Within and beyond the Academy</u> will discuss strategies for doctoral student placement and employment. Challenges, particularly in light of COVID-19, of the contemporary academic market will also be addressed.

The <u>Department Chairs Forum: Communication Administration at the Crossroads of Crises</u> will ask participants to take a big-picture view of crisis communication and consider strategies for addressing multiple intersecting concerns that exist within any single crisis. Presenters will offer strategies for communicating with stakeholders before opening the floor to discussion and brainstorming from all participants.
