The NCA 106th Annual Convention will be completely virtual and will include both asynchronous and synchronous sessions. Asynchronous content will be available beginning November 1 on NCA Convention Central. Most synchronous sessions will take place as originally scheduled on November 19-22. Communication at the Crossroads Series: Difficult Decisions and the Future of Our Associations

For the first time in over half a century, many Communication associations were forced to cancel their conventions this year. Though health, wellness, and a variety of other concerns may have rightly taken precedence in people's minds, it still meant the loss of significant professional and personal opportunities for those in the discipline and resulted in great disappointment for many individuals. For those in association leadership roles, it meant difficult decisions needed to be made. While this most recent experience was particularly profound, association leaders are frequently called on to make tough decisions about foreseen and unforeseen issues (e.g., strikes, disease, finances) that are becoming increasingly prominent in convention planning.

In this special session, <u>Difficult Decisions and the Future of Our Associations</u>, current and former Presidents and Executive Directors of Communication associations will discuss issues and challenges related to convention planning and decision making. They will also discuss the future of associations in regard to not only conventions but also academic life.

Those in attendance will gain a greater understanding of the discipline, how associations function, and decision-making processes in academia. The session will provide special insight for members of all associations, especially those interested in personally engaging in association leadership.
