106th Annual Convention General Session Recordings

The 106th Annual Convention general session videos are now available.

The NCA Opening Session "Mental Health at the Crossroads: Intersections in Health and Society," featured both NCA members and community members examining the factors that impact mental health and mental health treatment. Specifically, panelists examined ways in which mental health intersects with race, gender, sexual orientation, educational attainment, and income. The NCA Opening Session was sponsored by the Waterhouse Family Institute for the Study of Communication and Society.

The <u>Carroll C. Arnold Distinguished Lecture</u>, "The Challenge of Global Whiteness," was delivered by Thomas K. Nakayama, Northeastern University. Nakayama discussed how whiteness is not simply about racialization, but about a much larger and entrenched system that is shaped by local, national and global contexts. Looking to the past and the present, the global and the local, this presentation used a dialectical approach to expose the ways that these tensions give rise to whiteness.

NCA President Kent A. Ono delivered the <u>Presidential Address</u>, "Civic Activism and Social Justice: Leading NCA As/Through Change." His address explored the need for "civic activism," activism on behalf of people, leading itself as change (meaning that one's very presence is both a sign of and an active part of change) as well as leading during tremendous and challenging historical circumstances.
