NCA Annual Convention and COVID-19

Our 107th Annual Convention is just five weeks away and, along with the more than 2,000 members who have registered, I am looking forward to returning to our meeting's face-to-face format in the beautiful city of Seattle. We have nearly 1,000 sessions planned, many inspired by our theme of "Renewal and Transformation," that will engage, inform, and challenge us.

For those of you who are traveling to the convention, please be assured that we will follow all of the relevant health and safety mandates in place. Currently, the King County health orders governing Seattle require vaccine verification and masks for indoor facilities, including our two convention venues, and for entry to restaurants, taverns, and indoor entertainment venues. Please consult NCA's COVID-19 information webpage for more details about these requirements and the other health and safety measures that we will be implementing on site.

We recognize that some of you are choosing not to travel this year, and we understand your concerns. We are providing NCA interest groups with the option to host virtual business meetings prior to the convention (note that members must be registered to attend these meetings), in addition to the in-person, on-site meetings. While we will not be providing any virtual options for panels this year, we are <u>live streaming</u> nine key sessions, including the four "Renewal and Transformation" panels, the NCA Opening Session, the Carroll C. Arnold Distinguished Lecture, and the NCA Presidential Address and Awards Presentation. Registration is not required for these nine live streamed sessions, so if you are not able to travel to Seattle, please be sure to join us for them.

Carroll C. Arnold Distinguished Lecture

Tina M. Harris will deliver the 2021 <u>Carroll C. Arnold Distinguished Lecture</u>, "Intentional Transformation in the Midst of Change," which will challenge us to engage an embodied existence of intentional transformation and commit to

creating a new normal in response to the many inequities that have impacted every facet of life.

Dr. Harris holds the Douglas L. Manship Sr.-Dori Maynard Race, Media, and Cultural Literacy Endowed Chair at Louisiana State University. She is an outstanding scholar of interracial communication, focusing on crucial areas such as critical communication pedagogy, race and identity, diversity and media representations, racial social justice, mentoring, and racial reconciliation. In additional to numerous published articles and book chapters, she is co-author of the leading textbook, *Interracial Communication: Theory Into Practice* (2015, 3rd ed.).

Dr. Harris's scholarship consistently and insistently challenges us to consider both dimensions of our theme of "Renewal and Transformation" across the intersections of our academic and personal lives. What are the intellectual, social, and personal obligations to our communities of value that call for our renewed devotion? What are the paths that we must forge to create significant transformation in those same arenas? In our current cultural moment, when multiple political, social, and health crises have reshaped our every pursuit, her lecture will invite all of us to reinvigorate our commitments as Communication scholars and practitioners.

Renewal and Transformation Series: Dissent

In the wake of George Floyd's murder in May of 2020, protests broke out in Minneapolis and quickly spread across the country. These protests added to the calls for justice in Louisville, Kentucky, where police officers had killed Breonna Taylor only months earlier. Spreading first across the country, from Los Angeles to Atlanta to Tulsa, and later into the streets of Vancouver, Paris, Berlin, and London, calls to make Black lives actually matter quickly spanned the globe.

One of those places that saw major protest activity was Seattle, Washington. Activists took to the streets throughout the city for sustained demonstrations in the form of marches, sit-ins, and other direct confrontational actions. In the Dissent session, we focus on the protests and dissent that happened in the city during the summer of 2020. We engage with activists who were on the ground and get their perspectives on the direct actions that took place as they stood in opposition to the systemic racism, police brutality and violence directed at people of color in their city and beyond.
