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#### NCA Annual Convention and COVID-19

We are excited about the wonderful array of sessions to be held at the NCA 107<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention, which will be conducted as a face-to-face event. Please know that we recognize and hear your concerns and we are committed to adhering to all national, state, local, and facility health and safety guidelines as we continue to plan for our meeting in Seattle.

Per a new <u>health order</u> issued in King County, Washington State, on September 16, 2021, all attendees will need to provide verification that they are fully vaccinated prior to entry to public venues in Seattle, including our two convention sites. This order applies to all indoor restaurants, taverns, entertainment and recreational venues, exhibit halls, and convention centers. Masks also are required in these indoor spaces in King County. More information about vaccination verification and what is required by King County is available <u>here</u>.

For purposes of the new health order, "fully vaccinated" means that a person has received all the required doses of an FDA-authorized COVID-19 vaccine (two doses of the Moderna or Pfizer-BioNTech vaccines, or one dose of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine) or a WHO-authorized COVID-19 vaccine series, and that 14 days have passed since the final dose.

As an alternative to providing vaccine verification, prior to entry individuals must provide digital or printed documentation from a testing agent, including a laboratory, health care provider, or pharmacy of a negative FDA-approved PCR test administered within the previous 72 hours.

Consequently, all attendees at our 2021 Convention should be prepared to provide proof that they are fully vaccinated by presenting their CDC Covid-19 Vaccine Record card or photo of their card, or documentation of vaccine administration record from a vaccine provider, including an individual's doctor, pharmacy, or other official immunization record from within or outside the United States, including a photo or photocopy.

Registration is not required to view the live-streamed sessions.

# Renewal and Transformation Series: Disruption

To "dis" is to treat someone with contempt or show a lack of respect, bring someone down, or critique or insult a person's behavior, personality, or mere being. Can a pandemic "dis" higher education? The <u>Disruption</u> session explores what the "dis" in "disruption" means when analyzing the continuing effects of the pandemic on college/university teaching and learning. It's an understatement to suggest that the pandemic is merely a "disruption." Disruptions are usually unwelcome intrusions into the tried and true ways of doing things, the way we see the world and our role in it. However, connecting to the Renewal and Transformation theme, our disrupted approaches to teaching and learning create opportunities to reflect on how we typically do things, calling us to question our methods and innovate in ever-changing circumstances, such that growth is the result. In this Spotlight session, four pairs of teachers and students of diverse backgrounds come together to discuss the pros and cons of the disruption we all experience. Student perspectives are highlighted, in terms of how students manage disruptions to their learning and the growth they achieve in the experience.
