NCA Annual Convention and COVID-19

We very much look forward to seeing you in Seattle to partake in the fantastic array of sessions, programs, and events that we have planned as we engage our theme of "Renewal and Transformation." Our convention will be conducted as a face-to face event, and while we are excited about the return to this format, we also want to assure you that we are committed to adhering to all national, state, local, and facility health and safety guidelines.

The NCA leadership and our National Office staff are closely monitoring the evolving COVID-19 situation. We recognize that you may have concerns, so we encourage you to stay informed and to consider what is best for you and your friends and family as your make your own decision about whether to attend. Please be sure to consult our convention webpage for the latest updates and details about the health-related measures that we will be implementing at our two venues, the Sheraton Grand Seattle Hotel and the Washington State Convention Center.

For those who are planning to attend, please note the following:

- We will conduct our convention in accordance with the current CDC guidelines for meetings and will follow all applicable state, local, and facility requirements.
- In accordance with CDC recommendations, vaccinations or negative COVID-19 tests are not required for attendees, but we will follow the current state of Washington requirement and CDC guideline that masks be worn indoors, regardless of vaccination status. Please plan to bring appropriate masks to be worn during our convention.
- Per the current CDC recommendations, we ask that members who are unvaccinated stay home, stay safe, and do not travel to attend our convention.
- If you have COVID-19 or symptoms, we ask you to stay home.
- We plan to distribute stickers that will allow you to convey your level of comfort regarding personal proximity to
 others. We also will abide by all applicable social distance guidelines in our venues.
- We will provide hand sanitizer stations throughout our venues, place sanitizing wipes in all of our meeting rooms, and have additional masks available for attendees.

As we look forward to gathering together in November, we also are heartened by the recent CDC finding that nearly 92 percent of the U.S. population holding a bachelor's degree or higher has been fully vaccinated. Please know that we will seek to do our very best to address issues relating to COVID-19 and health as we embrace this in-person format for our convention.

For those who choose not to attend, we will provide live streaming of nine programs that will be accessible for free to all members via our website, including four special Renewal and Transformation sessions, the Carroll C. Arnold

Don't Miss the 2021 Teachers on Teaching Series

Irish playwright George Bernard Shaw's iniquitous observation "those that can, do; those who can't, teach," is an especially cynical misnomer that doesn't befit post-modern Communication educators. In fact, today our discipline boasts scholars who deliver state-of-the-art teaching, nurturing, and cultivation of todays' rising scholars.

Annually, NCA hosts a Teachers on Teaching series that honors outstanding Communication professors who are inspirational teachers and dedicated mentors, and who have made a difference through their works in and out of the classroom. This year's featured event at the Seattle convention will highlight two such Communication educators in 75-minute sessions, showcasing scholars who will share their stories of classroom successes, challenges, and "teachable moments." To highlight the reciprocal relationship between teachers and students, the sessions will also feature a cohort of current and/or former students who will offer remarks attesting to their teacher's positive influence on their academic, intellectual, and professional lives.

The Teachers on Teaching series gives rising scholars and teachers at all levels an opportunity to learn firsthand the importance of the total Communication classroom experience and the scholastic mentoring intricacies.

Scholar to Scholar Session Highlights

Scholar to Scholar (S2S) sessions employ a format wherein the presenters create posters that combine text and graphics to display their research. Each presenter will remain in close proximity to their poster and be available to answer questions and engage in discussions about their work. Compared to the more traditional format of panel presentations, the S2S session is much more interactive, with a cohort of wandering scholars and audience members engaging in one-on-one conversations with each scholar about their research. The S2S sessions demonstrate the ways in which scholars can display their work creatively, enable a more intimate engagement between presenters and audience members, and allow scholars access to an audience that is much broader than that typically in attendance at a more traditional panel presentation.
